













PROJECT DESCRIPTION


The Zum Hirshen project considers the relationship between tradition and modernity so as to redesign a place with its own authentic identity, symbolized by a functional architecture with an appropriate communicative impact. The desire to achieve a new concept in hospitality, the will to seek- even in the details, the essentiality, simplicity, and clarity of form and light are the motivation and expression of this new sign, where simplicity and light are the most distinguishing features. The main restructuring involved the existing building, creating new bedrooms in the attic, focusing on a new horizontal and vertical distribution, the reconstruction of the building's roofs, and the modification of the elevations. In addition, it was an opportunity to restructure the energy plant for the structure. Among the main materials used are larch wood and porphyry for flooring, spruce and birch


plywood for furnishings as well as natural


fabrics such as boiled wool and felt.
